Nora studied the history of journalism, with a focus on the turn of the twentieth century, for her master's degree from King's College London.

She served as the first president of the National Association for Media Literacy Education (NAMLE) and helped start several major media literacy initiatives, including the Journal for Media Literacy Education and Project Look Sharp.
